6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision of the People's Education Society is stated in the motto, "J/nkoku yHkrs Kkue~ I" ("Sharddhawan Labhate Dnyanum").

Use of education as a tool for upliftment of rural masses.

- i) To provide higher education facility in rural area.
- ii) To provide higher education to economically and socially backward students including male and female students.
- iii) To uplift the mental, physical and intellectual ability of rural student so that they can withstand against many challenges of growing Indian economy.
- iv) To promote talented students in rural area so that they can work independently for society, government and self development.
- v) Propaganda and propagation of higher education and awakening of rural people about importance of higher education.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

- The institution has MIS.
- Data regarding admission process is fed to the computer and manually analysed.
- Data regarding the student progression is analysed at departmental level.
- Data regarding examination and result are analysed by the examination cell.
- Information about human resource, leaves, achievements, academic progress, feed back is manually analysed.
- Management and Principal exploits the data for planning and development purpose.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- The teachers participate in workshops regarding the syllabus restructuring process to share the syllabi related issues.
- The college has monitoring mechanism to control the teaching learning process.
- Student feed back is analysed to make curriculum effective.
- Teachers attend refresher courses and orientation courses to impart curriculum effectively.
- Teachers are motivated to use ICT tools.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The institute ensures that students gain beneficial and comprehensive learning experiences by providing them opportunities for access to new areas of education, by adopting new methods of delivering educational inputs, by enhancing the quality of teachers and by improving the standards of the teaching aids.

The mechanisms used to sustain the quality of education are as follows:

- Teachers attend refresher courses and orientation courses to impart curriculum effectively.
 - The quality of teachers is improved by motivating them to seek admission to the Ph.D. and M.Phil. courses.
- Slow learners are identified through personal interaction and classroom discussions. To cater needs of slow learners, teachers adopt bilingual teaching, provide class notes and extra classes.
- To cater the needs of students teacher adopt process like guest lectures, class seminars, competitions.
- Learning resources like books and journals are purchased to ensure the availability of latest information to students.
- Inflibnet facility is made available.
- Evaluation of Teacher by student is carried out regularly to monitor performance of teacher.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The college being an affiliated institution, follows the examination and evaluation system prescribed by the University.
- Internal examinations and unit tests are carried out at departmental level.
- The institution conducts first year Exams for UG and arranges central assessment programme at college level. UG first year results are prepared and declared at college level using software. The university guidelines are followed for this purpose.
- Smooth conduct of all examinations are ensured by nominating internal vigilance squads.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The college continues to place emphasis on research work. It encourages its staff to undertake M.Phil. and Ph.D. studies, minor/major research project. In the pursuit of these, faculty are provided with infrastructural facility and leave facility.

Overall feedback of student about department teacher is good. Student complained about class control and pronunciation of some teachers. The student game worst feed back about the teaching aids in the classrooms.

BEST PRACTICE I

1. Title of the practice:

"Conservation of water by making Bandhara."

2. Objective of the practice:

Scanty of the water in the villages is the very common problem in the near-by villages of Jamkhed. So our college decided to set an example which could reflect the idea and importance of water conservation among the village people. The objectives of the program is set as follows

- 1. To create awareness about water conservation among the village people.
- 2. To motivate people to come together and work for solving their water problem.
- 3. To participate them with our NSS students in building 'Bhandhara' on stream/ rivulet in the village.
- 4. To set an example to build the 'Bandhara' which could store the rain water?
- 5. To inform the village people about the water shade program implemented by 'Government of Maharashtra'.

3. The Context:

The challenging issues and features related to the circumstances in village & corresponding task of making Bandhara are identified as follows.

- 1. To explain the importance of task to NSS student.
- 2. To decide the method of making Bandhara with the help of officers of soil water conservation.
- 3. To convey the task under taken & its importance to the village people & grampanchayat representatives.
- 4. To motivate students and local people to work together to complete the task in stipulated time.
- 5. To complete the task in the period 20/12/2013 to 26/12/2013.
- 6. To communicate the task with the land owners possess land in nearby area of the Bandhara.

4. The practice:

The scarcity of the water in the villages is the common problem in the Jamkhed Taluka.

The Jamkhed Taluka is draught prone area. The average /approximate rain fall in this area is around 700mm. It is insufficient to build major dams in the area. So the farmers always face scanty of water. So the agricultural yield is very low. The village people also face scanty of water for domestic purpose & raring of animals.

Considering the above background it becomes necessary to store every drop of rain water by exploiting the various means. In the villages there are streams & rivulets which overflow in the rainy season & water goes to rivers so it becomes necessary to work in this context.

The main problem is that local people are not aware about the problem and their simple solutions.

Our college,"Jamkhed Mahavidyalaya Jamkhed" decided to educate the village people by setting up an example. We decided to complete this task by building a bandhara on village rivulet with help & work contribution of the college NSS unit. Our NSS programme officers communicated with the village peoples and Grampanchayat members of village Halgoan, Tal – Jamkhed, Dist- Ahmednagar.

Our NSS volunteers worked hard and build a Bandhara on village rivulet using sand bags ,stones & murum . The material used was locally available and free cost. Local people also helped to complete the task. The task is completed in seven days by 100 NSS volunteers. The total length of Bandhara was 35 feet. This Bandhara was in good condition for 3 years.

Our college feels that the task of Bandhara building is unique and propagated healthy massage about simple way of water conservation. People came to know that few hours of work donation can solve problem of water scarcity. Other supplementary advantage was that the NSS students volunteered in the task were from different nearby villages. So they carried a good message with them & shared in their own village.

The constraint experience complete the task were not very dominating. The only limitation about the task is that this kind of Bandhara is not long lasting. It can store the water for 2 -3 years & needs yearly maintenance.

But young students / volunteers performed it with full enthusiasm & devotion. The villagers & Grampanchayat members admired to the work & thanked volunteers for the task.the villagers who directly involved in this task are Arjun Annasaheb Dhawale, Gorakh Baburao Kapse, Kisan Dagadu Dhawale , Rajendra kisanrao Dhawale ,Madan Vishnu Kapse , Kiran Dattu kale, Dhananjay Shivaji Dhawale.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required:

The problems encountered to implement the best practice of Bandhara making at village Halgaon, Tal-Jamkhed are as follows:


- 1. Initially village people did not believed that NSS volunteers can do the work. So they ignored the activity and refused to participate.

BEST PRACTICE 2

Title: Save Girl Child, Educate Girl Child Cycle Rally (Beti Bacho Beti Padhao)

The trend of decline in the Child Sex Ratio (CSR), defined as number of girls per 1000 of boys between 0-6 years of age, has been unabated since 1961. The decline from 945 in 1991 to 927 in 2001 and further to 918 in 2011 is alarming. The decline in the CSR is a major indicator of women dis-empowerment. Child Sex Ratio reflects both, pre-birth discrimination manifested through gender biased sex selection, and post birth discrimination against girls. Social construct discriminating against girls on the one hand, easy availability, affordability and subsequent misuse of diagnostic tools on the other hand, have been critical in increasing Sex Selective Elimination of girls leading to low Child Sex Ratio since coordinated and convergent efforts are needed to ensure survival, protection and empowerment of the girl child.

Considering above circumstances, our college Jamkhed Mahavidyalaya Jamkhed decided to arrange cycle rally to create awareness of the problem in the villages.

Objectives

- To prevent gender biased sex selective elimination.
- To ensure survival & protection of the girl child.
- To ensure education of the girl child.
- equality in boy and girl child
- increasing the girls enrollments in school, high school and college level
- in prove the ratio

Context:

- In the villages area the girl child's are early married so facing so many challenges in his married life so ensure that they not married in teen age.
- A small girl child can be a good daughter, a sister, a wife, a mother and other good relations in the future. If we kill them before taking birth or do not care after taking birth then how we will get a daughter, sister, wife or mother in future. Is anyone of us has ever thought that what will happen if women deny to be pregnant, give birth to a baby or give all responsibility of their motherhood to men. Are men able to do all such responsibilities? If not; then why girls are killed, why they supposed as curse, why they are burden to their parents or society. Why the eyes are not being open of the people even after many surprised truth and facts about girls.
- Now-a-days, women are working outside in the field with the men by meeting shoulder to shoulder together with their all the responsibilities at home. This is a big shame to us that still girls are victims of much violence even they have changed themselves to survive in this modern world.
